Helen Congleton



Helen Congleton, who was our speaker at our October 2005 meeting past away recently.

Helen Congleton, the only child of Russian-born parents, Vladimir and Nina Polhovsky. Helen Congleton was born in Yugoslavia on January 15, 1936. Helen immigrated to the United States in her early 20's and became a U.S. Citizen in 1964. She married David B. Congleton on July 2, 1977 at the Holy Virgin Mary Russian Orthodox Cathedral in Los Angeles, California. Helen resided in Huntington Beach for over 30 years. In recent years, Helen had retired from

Hughes Aircraft where she had worked as a Senior Engineer and Physicist. Helen Congleton was well recognized as an award-winning Orchid hobbyist and judge. She started growing orchids on her small patio 28 years ago, and four years later she and her husband moved to a new home large enough to support her orchid greenhouse and outdoor growing areas. She was internationally known in orchid circles for her impressive collection of Paphiopedilums (Lady Slipper Orchids). She thoroughly enjoyed breeding crosses and growing seedlings. She was an active member of The Orchid Society of California, American Orchid Society, and a Cymbidium Society of America judge, as well as a frequent speaker. In February 2006, she served as a Paphiopedilum judge at the world-renown Japan Grand Prix International Orchid Festival. She is survived by her two daughters, Linda and Catherine Congleton. In lieu of flowers, the daughters request donations be made to the Susan G. Komen Breast Cancer Foundation in Helen Congleton's name.

Article IX - STANDING COMMITTEES

Attachment I

Approved at the 6/23/07 Board Meeting

Annual Auction: The chair of the Annual Auction Committee shall be responsible for planning and executing the Annual Auction, to be held at the November Monthly Meeting. The duties of the Auction Committee are to: (1) acquire plant and related item donations from vendors and members; (2) provide labels for each lot to be auctioned; (3) staff the auction; (4) execute the auction, and (5) provide "Thank You" notes to each donor.

Hospitality: The chair of the Hospitality Committee shall be responsible for planning and providing food and refreshments at Society functions. The duties of the Hospitality Committee are to: (1) provide refreshments at the Monthly Meetings, and (2) plan and coordinating the Annual Potluck and providing the main course at the December Monthly Meeting.

Newsletter: The chair of the Newsletter Committee shall be responsible for the publication of a monthly newsletter for the Society. The duties of the Newsletter Committee are to: (1) gather articles and information for publication; (2) publish the newsletter prior to the meeting for that month; (3) mail and/or email copies to all Active and Honorary Members, and businesses supporting the Society.

Opportunity Table: The chair of the Opportunity Table Committee shall be responsible for the Opportunity Table at regular Monthly Meetings. The duties are to: (1) provide Opportunity Table tickets; (2) receive and turn over all payments to the Treasurer at the end of the meeting, and (3) maintain and make available to members the guidelines for the Opportunity Table.

Ribbon Judging: The chair of the Ribbon Judging Committee shall be responsible for judging plants presented by members of the Society at the Monthly Meeting. The duties of the Ribbon Judging Committee are to: (1) provide and present a written set of rules to govern the judging of plants; (2) be responsible for providing entry forms and award ribbons at the Monthly Meeting; (3) judge the plants at the Monthly Meeting; (4) provide results of the judging to the Newsletter Committee, and (5) keep a record of points awarded throughout the year and present a special award to the member with the most points.

Shows and Displays: The chair of the Shows and Displays Committee shall be responsible for representing the Society at various orchid shows in Southern California. Duties of the Shows and Displays Committee include: (1) representing the Society at meetings held by show committees; (2) coordinating member plant sales at those shows when opportunity provides such, and (3) establishing displays at those shows when needed.

Silent Auction: The chair of the Silent Auction Committee shall be responsible for the Silent Auction Table at regular Monthly Meetings. The duties are to: (1) assist members donating plants for the Silent Auction Table complete the auction form; (2) monitor the silent auction table; (3) monitor payment to the treasurer after the auction is closed, and (4) maintain and make available to members the rules for the Silent Auction Table.

Society Representation: The chair of the Society Representation Committee shall be responsible for representing the South Coast Orchid Society to the American Orchid Society (AOS) and the Orchid Digest. The duties of the Society Representation Committee include: (1) representing the Society to the AOS judges in attendance at their meeting coincident with the Society Monthly Meeting; (2) representing the Society to the AOS staff, especially the AOS Officers, Trustees, and Publications Committee; (3) representing the Society to the Orchid Digest Officers, Directors, and committees, and (4) pay dues and receive and make available to member the publications from other organizations.

JULY/AUGUST CHECKLIST

Cattleva

Cattleyas this month require careful attention to their watering and fertilizing needs owing to characteristically high temperatures. Evaporative cooling is a must in areas of the country where it is effective. Where it is not (the more humid regions), care needs to be paid to proper venting to keep temperatures within reason. Bottom vents in conjunction with top vents provide enough rising airflow to help keep plants cool. Increased air flow lessens humidity and dries plants out more guickly, necessitating more frequent damping down and watering, in areas where high humidity is not a problem. Higher light and heat indicate more fertilizer. The growths your plants are making now are the source of this autumn, winter and spring's blooms, so applying adequate fertilizer this month is the best way to ensure future blooms. Higher temperatures and humidity may also lead to fungal or bacterial rot problems, so it is important to closely observe your plants for any early indication of problems. Pests are also at a high point this month for the same reason.

Paphiopedilum

Cooling and air circulation are especially critical in these two months to prevent stress and avoid disease problems. Watering needs to be closely monitored to ensure that plants do not dry out. Warmer-growing hybrids will be at the peak of their blooming, with attention needing to be paid to staking of spikes. Look for water lodging in growths, which can rot emerging spikes and lead to the loss of the entire growth.

Phalaenopsis

Most, if not all, potting should be complete by now. This month and next are when these plants achieve their maximum growth. This growth will be that from which they set their spikes for the coming season. The more leaves the plants grow, the better potential for spiking will be realized. Growers in cooler areas such as the Pacific coast have the advantage this month, should they choose, of cooling for early season spikes. Lots of heat and light call for liberal applications of water and fertilizer.

Cymbidium

Summer can be the most rewarding season for cymbidiums. Growths should be coming strong now. The leaves of the new growths are best when they are broad and fairly stiff. The color should be a light green to nearly yellow. Early flowering varieties should be showing flower spikes, so move the plants into a cooler area with lower light. For mid-season varieties, lower the dosage of nitrogen to assist in spike initiation.

High-elevation Plants

For cooler-growing plants, such as masdevallias, other Pleurothallids and the like, the next few months will be a challenge. During the hottest times, keep your plants more shaded and be sure to keep the humidity level much higher. Do not let plants dry out. Delay any potting until the weather cools.

Laelia purpurata

The flowering season of this majestic plant will be coming to an end, presenting a good time to report. As soon as the new roots start to appear, clean off old bark and repot into a clean medium- grade fir bark. Place the plant in a little less light and higher humidity to relieve stress until it is more established, which is about one month after potting.

Odontocidium

Many of the intergeneric crosses between odontoglossums and oncidiums, such as Odontocidium, Wilsonara and Colmanara, will be blooming now. Take special care to train the spikes for best floral display. Keep plants under fairly shady conditions. Watch for snails and slugs.

Vandaceous

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Genera Plants will be growing quickly now and really enjoying the hot humid days so similar to their native habitat. Watch for pests though, as many of these also enjoy the same conditions as the plants. Check flower spikes so that they can extend unimpeded for the best flower presentation later.

TEMPERATURE - Certain species and their progeny have heavily mottled leaves, and are considered warm growing. A minimum night temperature of 60° F should be provided. Those plants with plain green leaves generally are considered cool growing and, in Southern California will comfortably withstand night temperatures in the low 40's. Daytime temperatures are relatively unimportant provided the plants are not under moisture stress. These rules are flexible since most plants are highly hybridized and are mixtures of warm and cool growing parents.

WATERING AND FERTILIZING - The most important consideration in growing these plants is their watering, for they must be kept moist at all times, never allowing them to dry out completely. Drainage is important, and a loose mix that allows free release of excess water is essential. Fertilizing can be done at every second or third watering, using any of the basic balanced fertilizers. Usually these are applied at one-half the recommended strength.

POTTING MIXES - The mix must be open, loose and well drained but moisture retentive. Seedling grade fir bark, sponge rock, sand, peat moss and fine charcoal are all used quite successfully. Your own growing conditions will dictate the varying proportions. Most mixes will last for a two year period before breakdown. Paphs may be repotted at any time of the year, even in bloom. Check the mix frequently for breakdown.

LIGHT AND VENTILATION - Paphs seem to grow best when shaded rather heavily, but light requirements may vary from plant to plant depending on the characteristics taken from the species parents. In general, 40% to 50% natural light will be satisfactory. Air movement is not an important factor, except the air around the plant must not become stagnant.

DISEASES AND PESTS - One of the nicest things about growing Paphs is that they are practically disease and pest free. An occasional mealy bug infestation may be encountered, but this can be controlled with an alcohol swab as required or a judicious spraying with any of the standard oil-free insecticides.

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
